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HELLO FROM THE NEWS EDITOR

Summer is in full swing, and my Lincoln garden is looking particularly lush thanks to the many downpours we've had this June. I never used to like wet weather, but as a relatively new gardener I am coming around to the benefits. For starters, all my primulas are all alive and well this year, whereas in contrast, the dry spells of last year caused heavy losses. It still surprises me how variable British weather can be.

This year is the 73rd SRGC Seed Exchange and I am planning to give it a go. The first time I encountered the seed exchange was a few years back when I came up to Scotland for an SRGC event put on for 'youngish' people. We were invited to help ourselves to leftover seed packets, which we did with enthusiasm. I was struck by the wide range of species available, which included some surprising submissions such as the notoriously invasive *Impatiens glandulifera* (Himalayan Balsam)!

My approach was to select several envelopes of seeds at random. Most of the genera I knew, but what was this *Tragopogon pratensis* I picked up? No doubt some choice exotic I thought. It wasn't until I got home and looked it up that I discovered it was Goat's Beard, a common dandelion-like species. I didn't have any success with my *Tragopogon pratensis*, but the *Cyclamen mirabile* and *Codonopsis clematidea* I chose that year are doing well.

There is more to being a seed donor to the exchange then pure altruism, as Ian and Carole Bainbridge explain in this edition of *Dryas*. Donors get priority when choosing seed, which can help you secure more highly sought species. Carole also gives some tips to help identify if *Celmisia* seed are viable – pointers which to a certain extent apply to other species. So - time to start saving seed (but preferably not Himalayan Balsam!).

GOLD AT GARDENING SCOTLAND

As in previous recent years the Club's involvement started on the Monday when Rob Graham collected our blue wooden boxes and other materials, which Billy Carruthers of Binny Plants accommodates for us at his nursery in West Lothian. We soon put it together. On Tuesday Ian Christie arrived with a large carload of *Meconopsis*, trilliums, orchids and anemones. A collection of dwarf conifers from Stan de Prato was set up on one side of our main stand. Later that day Liz Mills brought a crate of small alpines she had collected from Ardfearn. Richard Green and Peggy Anderson were now busy positioning and supporting plants; the pot tops have to be level although there are very different pot sizes. Richard has discovered that sheets of insulation material can be cut into sizes for packing underneath and between the pots. Gaps are then filled with bubble wrap and top dressed with moss or gravel appropriate to the section of the display. This means we can dispense with compost which makes dismantling on Sunday evening much quicker — and easier.

Plants came in from other members, notably arisaemas and insectivorous plants from Shelia McNulty from Ayrshire. Sandy Leven arrived with his estate car laden with beautifully presented polystyrene troughs. On Thursday Carole Bainbridge arrived to add her skills at fine tuning the stand while I moved outside to set up pallet gardens in a downpour. Judging took place later on Thursday, but it is on

Friday morning before the public get into the hall that you see the card – yet another gold medal for the Club, which has supported Gardening Scotland in every one of its twenty years. Over the three days the show was open to the public SRGC members manned – and womaned – the stand on a rota organised by Richard. Many visitors bought seeds, some attractively packaged by Ian Pryde and Norman McClure.

We understand the show will continue on the present site for at least another two years. We've already told the organisers that we anticipate contributing a stand in 2020. An illustrated article focusing on some of the plants on our stand will appear in the Club's journal later.

SEED DISTRIBUTION 2019

This was the fifth year that the SW Scotland Rock Garden Group ran the Seed Distribution side of the Seed Exchange. The experienced team was grateful to National Trust for Scotland for the use of Threave Gardens Visitor Centre again. Many members used the new online ordering system and the forms produced made processing orders much easier for the group.

Most packets made their way to their destinations overseas eventually. Postal delays could be shared via email and members in any one country could realise they were not alone. Some packets came back to base. One envelope was returned to sender as the recipient was away on holiday and had been unable to claim it from the postal service within the time limit; it was resent. One or two came back from Australia as customs had found some banned seed and decided to return the whole order to SRGC. Another went all the way to China and back because of an incomplete address; it made it at the second attempt.

If you are an overseas member please do check if your authority has seed import requirements. Those for members from USA from USA, New Zealand, Australia and Japan are given on page 13.

Good luck with your germinating seeds and do start saving seed to donate for the next exchange.

SEED DISTRIBUTION – THE VALUE OF DONOR STATUS

When seed distribution comes around, the SRGC Seed Exchange has a particular sequence for fulfilling your seed requests.

First, we do all the main requests, and the first picks always go to the **donors of seed for that year's exchange**. We sort the donors into a priority ranking; put simply, the donors who have sent the most seed for the most years will have their requests fulfilled first. The calculation we do means that if you send us 100 packets plus and it's your first year of donating to the exchange, you'll still be pretty close to the top of the list. In general, we like you to send five packets of seed to qualify for donor status, but if you send us a big packet of *Ranunculus lyallii* for example, we'll be very happy!

If yours is a family membership, you qualify for two donor picks at your donor ranking. This means it's better for you to **send us one donation on behalf of your family** rather than separate smaller donations from each of you, and it's easier for us to administer in the seed reception process.

Second, we fulfil the non-donor main requests. These are processed in the order of the date of their arrival, so it is an advantage for non-donors to send in their seed requests quickly.

Third, after the cut-off date for receipt for seed requests, we will fulfil the surplus requests. These are also done in the order of the date of their arrival, so it is an advantage for members wishing surplus seed to order quickly. Please also remember that by this point, many of the numbers will have been exhausted, so send us plenty of alternatives on your surplus request. Again, a family membership qualifies you for two surplus orders if you wish.

So, donate some seed this year and enhance your chances of getting the seed you want from the SRGC Seed Exchange.

SENDING CELMISIA SEED TO THE SRGC SEED EXCHANGE

Some SRGC Members like to grow New Zealand plants in the garden and regularly save seed to send to the Seed Exchange. However, when seed arrives, it can be disappointing to discover that most is infertile chaff and not viable seed. For those who regularly save *Celmisia* seed, here are a few tips to ensure that the seed you send is viable and has a good chance of germinating and providing plants to delight other members who order New Zealand seed.

First, seed should look and feel plump. In the wild *Celmisia* seed fertilisation is only about 10% in a good year – so most of your "seed" is infertile chaff.

To identify fertile *Celmisia* seed, there are a couple of techniques: <u>First</u>, take a pinch of seed and drop it from about 10 inches onto a paper plate. If the seed is fertile you will hear a faint "ping" as the seed hits the plate. <u>Second</u>, fertile seed is quite hard and rigid, by taking a seed between forefinger and thumb and gently pressing the pointed end against the forefinger of the other hand, you can determine if he seed is viable or not. Seed that bends is infertile, seed that remains rigid is probably fertile.

Good seed collecting, and hopefully, good germination.

AN APPEAL FOR VOLUNTEERS TO PACKET SEEDS

For new members of the SRGC, 'seed packeting' is the process of placing donated seeds into small glassine envelopes for later distribution. It is the middle process of the SRGC Seed Exchange and is of vital importance. Last year we had only just enough volunteers to cope and are therefore anxious to recruit new volunteers. It has been agreed that participants need not be members of the Club and that friends of members would be more than welcome to take part.

UPDATE ON THE SEED EXCHANGE WEB PORTAL

The new web portal opened as planned for the 2018 seed exchange, with 567 members completing 643 orders. This represented 63% of the total seed orders received, an increase on the 55% of orders submitted during the previous two years. Some 163 orders were made during the first 24 hours but this high level of activity then declined over the next week to less than 10 a day for most of the rest of the exchange period. Interestingly, the last order was received 1 minute before the exchange closed!

Several new features were made available, with feedback suggesting that members particularly appreciated being able to explore the seed list in advance of the exchange opening for orders. Needless to say, the introduction of the new portal was not without some teething problems, notably about registration and payment. Many bugs were fixed by our developer as soon as they became apparent and some additional functionality was added whilst the exchange was open. Work is ongoing to eliminate the remaining problems.

The development team received many helpful suggestions for improvement — thanks for these. Following this, some further development will be made this year. The most significant will be to separate payment from the ordering process. Hopefully this will result in a more intuitive experience for members. Answers to *frequently asked questions* will be made available to help users solve common problems encountered. Also, there will be further behind-the-scenes functionality to assist our Seed Team.

73RD SEED EXCHANGE 2019-2020

All seed correspondence, lists and queries can be sent to: seed@srgc.org.uk. We will ensure that emails reach the relevant manager.

Seed Donations (Autumn 2019)

Please send fresh clean seed as early as possible (no later than 31 October) to lan and Carole Bainbridge (see the Team subsection at the bottom of this item for the address). Late seed can be accepted if a list has been received by post or email by 31 October. The seed list will be compiled on 1 November, so late seed may not make the exchange.

On each packet please write the full name of the seed, where it was collected (if wild), and your name or initials. Put all seed of one type in one packet, using small packets when possible (avoid big packets!).

Supply a list of donated seed in alphabetical order. Note your email, phone number and membership number in case we have queries, and provide comments on any new or rare seed.

Wild Seed

The reputation of the SRGC is at risk if we offer seed that has been collected illegally or does not have distribution permission. This could harm future attempts by people who want to collect seed legitimately. The SRGC is not able to check seed submissions, so please do not submit wild collected seed that would put our reputation at risk. Please also retain the documentation giving any relevant permission for as long as possible.

Seed Lists

All members (except those with paperless subscriptions) will receive a seed list automatically by post late November. Ensure your membership is renewed promptly to ensure you receive a seed list. The request system will be live until 15 January, which is the closing date for receipt of all seed orders.

Online ordering

The 73rd seed list will be available on the portal from 22 November for members who registered last year (www.srgcseed.net). Please use your email address and the password you created last year to login. If you've forgotten your password, you will be able to reset it when you try to login. If you didn't use the online portal last year, please try it this year - you will be able to register from 22 November. The portal will then open for orders on 30 November.

Seed Packeting

Packeting will be done during November / early December. The Ayrshire group would be very grateful to hear from any UK member willing to volunteer to packet seeds (see appeal on page 10).

Seed Distribution (Early 2020)

The South-West Scotland Group will manage the distribution again in 2019. Full details of the arrangements for ordering seed will be included in the seed list and

on the website. Requests must reach the **Seed Request Manager**, Neil McNulty, by 15 January 2020.

The seed distribution will begin in mid-January and all main requests will be sent out by late January. Donors' seed requests are completed first, then non-donors' in order of their arrival date followed by surplus seed requests (see page 9 for benefits of being a donor). This means that main and surplus requests are sent out separately and may arrive a few weeks apart. The whole distribution should be completed by the end of January. Please allow for delays in the postal system, waiting until after 5 February before enquiring with Neil McNulty about the whereabouts of your seeds.

USA

Members from the USA must have a permit, which is issued by APHIS, see: http://www.aphis.usda.gov/import_export/plants/plant_imports/smalllots_seed. shtml. This must be a 'small lots' permit, as this does not require UK phytosanitary certification. Please apply for your permits ahead of the exchange to ensure there is no delay in getting your seeds to you. Permits are valid for three years so if you are using an old one please check it is valid to the end of February 2020. You must email or enclose a copy of the permit and conditions with your request. Each numbered green/yellow customs label may be used once only; please send one for each request - one for a main request, and one for each surplus request of 50 packets.

If you order seed online, you must still send the permit documents and labels to Neil McNulty, as soon as possible - preferably to arrive well before 15 January (or you may send them to Ian and Carole Bainbridge with your seed donation). We must stress that "no permit, no seed" is the SRGC rule! We will do our best to get everyone their seed, but it must be in compliance with USDA regulations.

Australia, New Zealand

There are lists of allowed/banned plant taxa. Please check your request against these **BEFORE** placing your order. Customs may bin your whole order or return it to SRGC if it has banned seeds.

Japan

A phytosanitary certificate is required. All the seeds must be examined by an inspector here; his/her time is charged to the client. This charge is high and is

payable by the member. Most members this year found it very expensive for just a few seeds, not even a complete request. Seed exchange for Japan may need to be suspended until conditions are relaxed for small groups sending small amounts of seed such as ours.

Other overseas members

Please check with your authorities whether your country has any seed import requirements. Let us know what we need to do and send any necessary documentation. We do wish to comply with any laws relating to seed imports.
