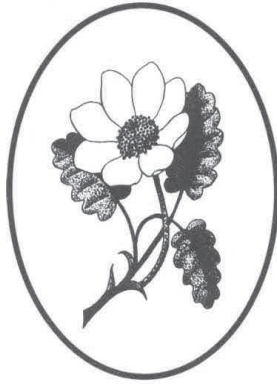

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the Scottish Rock Garden Club held on Saturday 12 Nov. 2016 in the Balformo Road Church Hall, Scone at 1 pm

The president, Professor David Rankin, welcomed 62 members to the Annual General Meeting of the Scottish Rock Garden Club. He remarked that he was impressed by the range of activities of the club, now 83 years old, and that we should celebrate this. He hoped that the club would still be flourishing in another 80 years.

The president reported the deaths of members including Jamie Taggart - nurseryman at Lynn Botanic Garden, Viv Chambers - with Anne a grower, shower and long-standing supporter of the club, Ian Smith – first convener of the Moray group, Lady Phyllis Yonge – long-time supporter of the Edinburgh Group, and Harley Milne - past president, Edinburgh group convener and show secretary, who was shown high up on a mountain – looking for plants on a snowy day!

4. President's review of the year

There is a lot to report, this year and every year, reflecting the wide range of activities of our lively club. And that reflects the diverse interests of our members. To some it is growing mountain plants that is most important, and for some of them showing plants, grown to the highest possible standards, is an integral part of that. For others, it is the friendship found in local groups, meeting for talks and garden visits, and at shows. But our meetings and shows are mainly relevant to those of us who live in Scotland or the north of England – and that is less than half of our members. For those who live further away, the highlights may be seeing plants growing in the wild, receiving the journal twice a year, taking part in the forum, following logs and reports on the website, or being involved in the seed exchange. Occasionally, people from further afield meet, at our annual discussion weekends or the ten-yearly international conferences.

Apart from the website, these activities are very much part of the original concept of the Club when it was established in 1933. The minutes of that meeting are part of the club archive, some of which has been transferred to the Royal Botanic Garden

Edinburgh. There it will be catalogued, and it will be freely available to members.

Our shows are one of the main ways in which we bring our interest in plants to the wider public. There are ten competitive shows each year, three of them held jointly with the Alpine Garden Society, as well as three non-competitive ones. Each one is run by a local team, so there are a huge number of people contributing. Thank you all. David Millward is taking over from Barry Caudwell as convener of show secretaries, which involves complex tasks such as coordinating the diary of dates and preparing show schedules for publication. Special thanks to both of them.

The club's displays at Gardening Scotland have been impressive in recent years, but the team really excelled this year. They won a Premier Gold Award for the first time, and a special award for the best display of alpine plants in the show. Premier Gold Awards were instituted a few years ago, and there are just five of them each year. These displays involve a great deal of work, in the planning and preparation, in building up over four days, in talking to the public for three days, and in the final demolition and clearing up – which takes just a few hours. That last stage is sad, but the rest is creative, sometimes exhilarating, and the outcome is a beautiful display, which shows the public something of the plants that inspire us all. We thank the many people who contribute.

We owe a huge debt of gratitude to Anton Edwards, who has edited *The Rock Garden* for many years. He manages to acquire sufficient interesting material, sometimes after pursuing reluctant authors, to fill more than 250 pages a year. Look at any one page, and think about the effort involved in preparing it in such an attractive way. Then look at a whole article, and think about the editing of the content, the cropping, adjusting colours and arranging of photographs. Then look at a whole issue, and think about getting it filled exactly to the brim. For many of our members, this is the part of the club that is most important to them, and its continuing high quality is a matter for satisfaction.

The website is probably our most public face, and the Forum is the most active part of that. Ian and Maggi Young and Fred Carrie have put an enormous amount into our on-line presence for many years. Ian also produces his *Bulb log* every week and the *International Rock Gardener* on-line journal every month. Together, all of these have built up an invaluable information resource. Other people need to be involved, and we are looking at how we can develop in the future, while safeguarding the best of what has already been done. Use of social media is developing, with more to be done.

Our total membership is about 2300, plus electronic memberships, and some of these are for families. The total number of people is somewhat less than 3000, holding up reasonably well, but consistently declining a little from year to year. It is good to see young people starting to take a more prominent role; we should remember that those people who met in the Rutland Bar in 1933 to form the Club we would now regard as young!

Fortunately, our finances are in good shape, as seen in the financial report. However,

there are consequences of the decrease in membership.

One consequence is that core costs remain much the same, regardless of the number of members. It costs about £6500 to produce the first copy of our journal; each subsequent one costs a little over £1. So we need to be looking for ways to reach out to more people, as well as being careful and efficient in our use of our resources.

All our local groups continue, some with smaller numbers and others finding it difficult to get members to take on leadership roles. We will be looking at ways we can tackle this, perhaps by increasing cooperation between our groups and with those of other societies.

Good news is that we were left £10000 by David Boyd. We have decided to use this to have series of one- or two-day events, in places where there are a few members of the Club, but no local group. The first, called "Rock Gardening from the Ground Up" and pioneered by Carol and David Shaw, will be in Grantown-on-Spey on July 8th 2017. Who are working with both Badenoch and Nairn Gardening Clubs, and aim to attract people from all along the Spey Valley. A second one, with a very different format, is being considered for the Outer Isles in 2017.

Our healthy finances enable us to support various activities that contribute to our charitable aims.

The Diana Aitchison Fund gives grants to individuals to help them pursue a career in horticulture. The number of awards was smaller this year, after an exceptionally large number was made last year. It is encouraging to see that one of our new council members, Hannah Wilson, was a recent beneficiary of this fund, which helped her to complete her degree at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh, where she has now started a PhD.

In contrast, there were an unprecedented number of good applications for exploration grants this year, and ten grants were made, for expeditions to Bhutan, the Black Sea, China, Iran and Spain. There isn't a specific fund for this purpose, and needs have to be balanced against other calls on the club's resources. We have received a donation from Dr Bissy Genova, a member in Bulgaria; other contributions are of course always welcome.

During the year we have also made grants to aid the publication of a book by Janis Ruksans on crocuses, to sponsor a speaker at the Czech International Rock Garden Conference, and we have contributed to refurbishment of the old alpine house at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh.

The seed exchange continues to flourish, with the South West Scotland Group doing a great deal of work through the various phases – receiving seed, preparing the list, packeting, receiving orders and distributing seed. George Watt has taken over from Ian Pryde as Packeting Manager; we are particularly grateful to them for past and future work, as well as to the large number of people who work cheerfully and efficiently. A lot of thought also goes into developing the processes involved in the

exchange. The fact that most of us don't notice them is a testament to their efficacy!

We also use some of our funds to support educational meetings – i.e. the annual discussion weekends and the ten-yearly international conference. Our support is mainly used to bring a sparkling array of star speakers. This year's discussion weekend was run by the Edinburgh and the Lothians' Rock Garden Group at the Cardrona, in the Borders. The sense of people enjoying themselves grew through the weekend, as we were treated to eight outstanding talks, covering subjects including fritillaries, Scottish natives, hellebores, an alpine garden in Germany, a nursery in Scotland, a garden in America and planting hunting in Peru. So many people contributed, and we are really grateful to them all. And the team is back planning for a second weekend in 2017. They have set themselves high standards.

Plans for the international conference in 2021 have been started under the leadership of Sandy Leven. It is to be in Perth from May 8th to 11th. Talks and other planned activities will take place in the Perth Conference Centre, where there will be provision for all the eating and drinking and socialising. Accommodation will be in hotels etc. nearby – or further away if you prefer – allowing participants to choose the level of facilities (and price).

All of these activities are coordinated by Council, all of whose members are now on the five Working Groups. These are effectively sub-committees consisting of Council members and other co-opted people. Much of the work of the Club is devolved to them. We thank everyone who works so hard, particularly the members who have completed their three-year term of office: Julia Corden, Peter Maguire, Sheila McNulty and Peter Semple; David Shaw and Barry Caudwell, standing down as chairmen of group conveners and show secretaries; and Carol Shaw, who has kept the Club on course during eight years as secretary.

As we look to the future, we need to think about how we meet the needs and aspirations of the next generation. Many live in flats and don't have gardens. Do others have spare space, or need help to look after their plants? Could we have a buddy system, or mentoring? If we continue to evolve as a club, we will flourish.

8. Consideration and adoption of accounts

d) Without the bequest the club would have lost £10,000.

e) On the 30th June 2016 the club had assets of £545,784. £261,773 of this is in the restricted Diana Aitchison fund. Julia Corden expressed a hope that more students could be found to benefit from this educational fund.

The treasurer recommended the accounts for approval. Julia Corden proposed adoption of the accounts and Liz Mills seconded the motion, which was then approved by the meeting.

The President expressed thanks to Glassford Sprunt for his work, including selling a million plant labels at the meetings over the years.

The meeting expressed its thanks to Carol Shaw for all her hard work as secretary for the club. David Rankin confirmed that she had been sent a bouquet of flowers. He then closed the meeting and thanked people for attending.
